



COMMISSIONER'S MESSAGE

'Fun-raising,' by the numbers

Welcome to AAJA's 30th anniversary and the 16th installment of "The Bowl"!

In this broadcast studio tonight are many of our Asian American Journalists Association founders, current and former AAJA-Los Angeles board members, longtime sponsors, new funders and students — many who are friends and advocates of AAJA's mission of promoting diversity in the media.

Trivia Bowl is our signature event in L.A. and the only fundraiser the chapter holds to support student scholarships, internships, mid-career fellowships, stipends and workshops. In 2010-11, we have distributed more than \$50,000 in funding.

This is the lucky seventh time I've led our "fun-raising" effort, and the luck has been in turning a corner in the creative way we raise money in this extremely challenging economic environment.

Each time I have led Trivia Bowl, we have added new elements. Ten years ago, for our 20th anniversary, we transitioned from a chalkboard scoreboard and a Little Tokyo community room that held a small number of teams to this broadcast studio with more than 40 competitive teams filled with our sponsors and community partners. Five years ago, for our 25th anniversary, supported by exceptionally high-level sponsorships and donations and through the generosity of all involved, we grossed nearly \$90,000.

Tonight, for our 30th anniversary, to continue the innovative "fun-raising" tradition of our marquee event, we are hosting the inaugural College Bowl and projecting a live Twitter feed (@AAJATriviaBowl) in conjunction with our top raffle prize.

FOUNDER'S MESSAGE

Bill Sing's call for future:

It became a labor of love. Much of what I learned about life, leadership and commitment, I learned through my involvement with AAJA.

Many of you may be too young to remember those challenging times back in 1981 when we started AAJA.

Stereotypes and racial insensitivity concerning Asian Americans were common. We were often portrayed as quiet and passive. Asian American issues and communities were seldom covered.

Asian American journalists were few and far between. When I launched my career at the L.A. Times in 1979, AAJA co-founders Nancy Yoshihara and David Kishiyama were among the few Asian American faces there. Co-founders Tritia Toyota and Frank Kwan were among the few Asian Americans on TV in Los Angeles.

The need for AAJA was simply compelling, and it became a labor of love. Much of what I learned about life, leadership and commitment, I learned through my involvement with AAJA.

But it wasn't easy.

It wasn't "cool" to be a person of color in the newsroom. Many Asian American journalists were reluctant to join AAJA in the early years.

And it took a lot of hard work and courage to coordinate mailing lists, fundraisers, chapters, our first convention and staff. Many naysayers said we couldn't do it.

Fast forward to today. You have chapters and members across the country, scholarships, fellowships, management training programs, job fairs. AAJA is well respected.

Congratulations. I'm very proud of how far you've come.

But don't get too celebratory. The challenges are just as daunting today as they were 30 years ago.

Newspapers and broadcast outlets are struggling with the Internet revolution and massive changes in how people access information. Audiences are more demanding and less loyal. Journalists' credibility and integrity are being questioned.

The need for diversity often gets lost amid downsizings and management shuffles. Jobs are in peril, and many journalists of color are leaving the profession. None of the original six AAJA co-founders remain as full-time journalists. Yet the number of "journalists" seems to be proliferating with the growth of social media and the Internet. The news media can be as powerful and influential as ever.

So what should you and AAJA do?

Think big, be ambitious

Think and act big. Take on a larger, more ambitious mission: to improve journalism and ensure that it has a bright and influential future. Show that Asian American journalists will contribute to this exciting future in unique and compelling ways.

Embrace the changing demographics and priorities of our communities and create coverage that reflects this. Get into positions of authority and use that to innovate and make a difference. Use your conventions to debate and develop policies and solutions. Find talented leaders and put them into the top positions.

Put more people of color going to be." on the boards of top media corporations. What the heck, put some top industry leaders on your board! Hold joint conventions with the top industry organizations. Shake things up. Don't accept the status quo. We didn't 30 years ago.

Because we are in Los Angeles, a sports and entertainment capital and birthplace of AAJA, follow the wisdom of two L.A. sports icons: Wayne Gretzky and John Wooden.

The Great One said: "A GOOD hockey player plays where the puck is. A GREAT hockey player plays where the puck is

Fellow AAJAers, play where the puck is going to be. Anticipate the future and shape it. Keep developing innovative programs, strategies and people that secure the future. Be visionary - just as we were 30 years ago.

Coach Wooden said: "Learn as if you were to live forever. Live as if you were to die tomorrow."

So keep learning and growing. Challenge yourselves to get better. Journalism is a blessing. Practice it to the fullest. And have fun doing it. See you again at the 35th.

TRIVIA BOWL HISTORY & LORE

Trivia Bowl is the signature team competition fundraiser of the Asian American Journalists Association's Los Angeles Chapter. Since 1994, proceeds from the event have supported the chapter's scholarship, internship, fellowship and professional development programs.

Initially, the game was conceptualized as a low-budget, low-tech local chapter fundraiser. What started as a modest, whimsical effort has evolved into a popular community "fun-raising" experience. Media groups, corporate sponsors, community partners and now college teams compete to pursue their friendly rivalries and support AAJA-LA.



TRIVIA BOWL RULES

Here's the 411

Each team may have as many as 10 members. Once the competition begins, no substitutions are allowed. No one may sit at a team table except its 10 original designated players.

Trivia Bowl XVI will have five rounds of 20 questions each: 1) current events; 2) more current events and history; 3) arts and entertainment; 4) science, geography and literature; 5) sports and California living.

David Ono, the emcee, will read aloud the questions. Sitting at their designated table, the members of each team work together to fill out the answer sheet. The emcee will read each question twice. Competitors are advised to write down the questions for their reference.

The name of the team and its captain must be written on the answer sheet for each round. All answers must be legible and in English unless another language is specified. Answers must be written on the exact line corresponding to the number of the question.

Only one answer per question will

be accepted unless more than one answer is clearly requested. When multiple answers are requested, all must be correct for the team to obtain the point. When a person's name is requested, last names are acceptable unless first and last are specified. Phonetic spelling is acceptable unless the correct spelling is specified. There are no partial points for an answer.

Once the emcee has read the 20th and final question of each round, teams have two minutes to complete their answer sheets. Room monitors will collect the sheets from team captains and take them to the judging table. Once an answer sheet is submitted, no changes are allowed.

Scoring

After each round, the emcee will read aloud the questions and correct answers after game officials have collected the answer sheets. The judges will review and score the answer sheets during this time. Team scores and standings for each round will be posted on the scoreboard.

Challenges

Any challenges to questions should be brought to the attention of the quiz masters by the team captain or a designated representative before the end of the evening competition. The game manager's decision is final. No competitor may speak to the judges or scorekeepers.

Leaving the Team Table

No one who leaves a team table while a round is in progress will be allowed to return until the team submits its answer sheet. Please make all trips to the hospitality tables, refreshment area or restroom before or after rounds.

Prohibition on Electronic Devices

The use of all electronic devices (phones, tablets, laptops, PDAs, cameras, video devices, etc.) is strictly prohibited while a competition round is in progress. If any such device is visible, game officials will request that it is put away. Any person who uses such a device must leave the team table and may not return to the game. Game officials have the discretion to deduct as many as 10 points or an entire round from a team's score if any member violates this rule.

Texting or tweeting about the event, including but not limited to @AAJATriviaBowl, is permitted only between competition rounds.

Printed Materials

No printed materials other than those provided and sanctioned by Trivia Bowl organizers and sponsors are allowed on the team table. Anyone caught using cheat sheets or notes will be subject to the same penalties regarding the improper use of electronic devices.

Purses, bags, briefcases and items containing printed materials must be placed on the floor.

Substitutions and Spectators

Team member substitution is prohibited at all times during the competition. Once the competition begins, a team may not replace an original player with another individual. If for any reason a player must leave the event, the team must proceed without that member. Game officials have the discretion to deduct as many as 10 points from a team's score if such violations occur.

Noncompeting spectators (including guests, chaperons and parents) may not stand near or approach the team table while a round is in progress and until the team submits its answer sheet for that round.

All communication, oral or otherwise, is prohibited between a team and spectators while a round is in progress. Game officials have the discretion to deduct as many as 10 points for violations.

Tie-Breakers

If any teams are tied for any of the top three places in the overall standings after the end of the final round, these guidelines will be applied in the following order until a winner is declared:

- 1. Number of first-place finishes in a round.
- 2. Number of highest finishes in a round in head-to-head competition.
- 3. Number of questions answered correctly in the first round before answering a question incorrectly.

This signed Pulitzer Prize iconic photo could be yours.



We are proud to recognize photographer Nick Ut, recently awarded AAJA's Lifetime Achievement Award, as our Los Angeles Chapter colleague.

Nick gained fame for his Pulitzer Prize-winning work during the Vietnam War. On June 8, 1972, he covered a misdirected South Vietnamese air raid on the village of Trang Bang. As Nick, then only 21, photographed fleeing villagers, he captured a now-iconic image of 9-year-old Phan Thi Kim Phuc running naked, with burns covering most of her body. Nick recognized the girl's plight and drove her to a hospital, probably saving her life.
