Spotlighting Trivia Bowl — and beyond

Dear AAJA-LA members and friends:

We welcome you to Trivia Bowl — and we're grateful that our signature fundraiser, now marking its 25th birthday, is in the spotlight thanks to your energy and your donations.

Our goal for the Los Angeles chapter of AAJA is to offer support like no other — and serving your needs has won us "Chapter of the Year" twice in the last three years. Here's a rundown of what we've been offering, as we continue to provide more than \$20,000 in annual funding for internships in local newsrooms.

Launching 2023 was a Lunar New Year party we hosted at the Japanese American Cultural & Community Center. We organized a reporters' roundtable on mass shootings and the chapter partnered with the Go For Broke National Education Center to offer the Summer Journalism Institute to teach high school students new skills. We also presented a panel on "How to report on health with any beat," followed by a panel on health inequities and community engagement, both sparked by a grant from the California Endowment.

To honor journalism legends and talent, we joined with the Los Angeles Times to create two new funds dedicated to skills training and career development, paying tribute to the late Henry Fuhrmann and Gregory Yuen Yee, former Times assistant managing editor and reporter, respectively.

A Randy Hagihara fund will issue stipends to help journalists searching for new job opportunities. Last month, AAJA-LA also hosted its first Randy Hagihara Mentor Day at Cal State Los Angeles, supported by the L.A. chapters of the National Association of Black Journalists and NLGJA: The Association of LGBTO+ Journalists.

We're lucky to have some not so trivial milestones:

- AAJA-LA has raised nearly \$500,000 in funding to support journalism students; boost training to AAPI journalists to be visible leaders for positive and diverse change in the industry; and forge stronger ties within the AAPI communities.
- In the beginning, Trivia Bowl comprised less than 10 teams, with scoring tracked on a flip chalkboard. Soon, it evolved into a magnetic 500-person event at ABC7 Studio B, heralded with confetti streamer cannons and a digital scoreboard.
- The Japanese American National Museum and Nishi Hongwanji Buddhist Temple in Little Tokyo have also been Trivia Bowl host locations.
- In 2011, we added a College Bowl within the structure of Trivia Bowl, allowing college student teams to compete for the Grasshopper Cup.
- We introduced the Spirit Award in 2012, spotlighting the team that showcases the most positive engagement, animated enthusiasm and creative uniforms. Tonight's winners will earn a year's worth of instant ramen noodles.

So noodle on this — it's heartwarming you are here. We're so grateful for your AAJA-LA Trivia Bowl energy and support. Good luck to all your special teams!

2023 TRIVIA BOWL RULES

Here's the 411

AAJA-LA developed, abides by and enforces the following International Trivia Bowl Federation competition rules.

2023 Competition

Each team may have as many as 10 members. Once the competition begins, no substitutions are allowed. No one may sit at a team table except its 10 original designated players. Trivia Bowl XXV will have five rounds of 15 questions each. The question categories are: 1) Current Events; 2) Politics, History and Literature; 3) Arts and Entertainment; 4) Science, Technology and Geography; 5) Sports and California Living.

David Ono, the emcee, will read aloud the questions. Sitting at their designated table, the members of each team work together to fill out the answer sheet. The emcee will read each question twice. Competitors are advised to write down the questions for their reference.

The name of the team and its captain must be written on the answer sheet for each round. Failure to write the team

name on the answer sheet can result in forfeiture of the entire question round. All answers must be legible and in English unless another language is specified. Answers should be spelled correctly and written on the exact line corresponding to the number of the question.

Only one answer per question will be accepted unless more than one answer is clearly requested. When multiple answers are requested, all must be correct for the team to obtain the point. When a person's name is requested, last names are acceptable unless first and last are specified. Phonetic spelling is acceptable unless the correct spelling is specified. There are no partial points for an answer.

Once the emcee has read the 15th and final question of each round, teams have two minutes to complete their answer sheets. Room monitors will collect the sheets from team captains and take them to the Trivia Bowl judicial bench. Once an answer sheet is submitted, no changes are allowed.

Scoring

After each round, the emcee will read aloud the questions and correct answers after game officials have collected the answer sheets. The judges will review and score the answer sheets during this time. Team scores and standings for each round will be posted on the scoreboard. The team with the highest score at the end of the fifth round wins possession for one year of the coveted Rice Cup trophy.

Challenges

Any challenges to questions should be brought to the attention of AAJA-LA by the team captain or a designated representative before the end of the evening competition. The game manager's decision is final. No competitor may speak to the judges or the scorekeepers.

Leaving the Team Table

No one who leaves a team table while a round is in progress will be allowed to return until the team submits its answer sheet. Please make all trips to the hospitality table, refreshment area or restroom between rounds.

Prohibition on Electronic Devices

The use of all electronic devices (phones. tablets, laptops, PDAs, cameras, video and audio spy devices, drones, etc.) is strictly prohibited while a competition round is in progress. If any such device is visible, game officials will request that it is put away. Any person who uses such a device must leave the team table and may not return to the game during that round. Game officials have the discretion to deduct as many as 10 points or an entire round from a team's score if any member violates this rule. Texting or tweeting about or livestreaming the event, including but not limited to @AAJATriviaBowl, is permitted only between competition rounds.

Printed Materials

No printed materials other than those provided and sanctioned by Trivia Bowl organizers and sponsors are allowed on the team table. Anyone caught using cheat sheets or notes will be subject to the same penalties regarding the improper use of electronic devices. Purses, bags, backpacks, briefcases and items containing printed materials must be placed on the floor.

Substitutions and Spectators

Team member substitution is prohibited at all times during the competition. Once the competition begins, a team may not replace an original player with another individual. If for any reason a player must leave the event, the team must proceed without that member. Game officials have the discretion to deduct as many as 10 points from a team's score if such violations occur.


During the competition, spectators may be present only in designated areas. Noncompeting spectators (including guests, chaperones and parents) may not stand near or approach the team table while a round is in progress and must wait until the team submits its answer sheet for that round. All communication, oral or otherwise, is prohibited between a team and spectators while a round is in progress. Game officials have the discretion to deduct as many as 10 points for violations.

Tiebreakers

If any teams are tied for any of the top three places in the overall standings at the end of the final round, "sudden death" will be used as a tiebreaker. The rules will be announced at the start of the competition.

Trivia Bowl is the signature team competition fundraiser of the Asian American Journalists Association's Los Angeles Chapter. Since 1994, proceeds from the event have supported the chapter's scholarship, internship, fellowship and professional development programs.

Initially, the game was conceptualized as a low-budget, low-tech local chapter fundraiser. What started as a modest, whimsical effort has evolved into a popular, marquee community "fun-raising" experience. Media groups, corporate sponsors, community partners and college teams compete to pursue their friendly rivalries and support AAJA-LA.





Henry Fuhrmann

In honor of the elder statesman of our chapter and the late newsroom copy editing chief, AAJA-LA and the Los Angeles Times created the Henry Fuhrmann Multiplatform Editing Internship that debuted in the summer of 2023.

Henry's passing at age 65 in September 2022 drew tributes from around the globe. The self-described "word nerd" who fought for fairness in grammar has been hailed as tenacious and principled. A Times obituary by Thomas Curwen detailed how the hyphen in Asian-Americans was often overlooked, yet Henry "saw in the simple construction an unnecessary and derogative diminution of American identities and understood that no battle was too small in the fight for clarity, precision and fairness."

Those hyphens "serve to divide even as they are meant to connect. Their use in racial and ethnic identities can connote an otherness, a sense that people of color are somehow not full citizens or fully American," Henry wrote in a 2019 essay.

In media organizations around the country, he argued against its usage and

prevailed in persuading the Associated Press Stylebook to drop its mandate on the hyphen when mentioning "an American person's heritage."

In 2015, Henry retired as Times assistant managing editor, having cemented his place on the masthead.

AAJA's board of directors chose to give its 2023 Lifetime Achievement Award to Henry "for his lifelong dedication to excellence in journalism, his leadership through humble service, his generous mentorship of future generations and commitment to AAJA."

In its announcement, the board said "Henry's guidance and voice have shaped the careers and lives of countless people in the AAJA family over three decades. AAJA is deeply grateful for Henry's commitment to AAJA's mission and to the pursuit of increased, fair and comprehensive coverage of the AAPI community. So many in the AAJA family are indebted to Henry and the example he set for us to follow."

Randy Hagihara



As senior editor for recruitment, Randy Hagihara was often an aspiring journalist's first contact with the Los Angeles Times. His stern demeanor gave away nothing.

But if he saw something in you, a spark in your writing or a determination to push extra hard to get a story, he became your biggest ally. Once you were in the building, he was the editor you sought out when you felt at sea, when you needed career advice or wanted to be regaled with a war story from his Orange County days.

Randy, who died in January of esophageal cancer at age 72, was known for looking past brand name schools and recruiting diverse talent with more humble origins for The Times' internships and Metpro program (now called the Los Angeles Times Fellowship).

Today, the journalists Randy mentored are leading from the L.A. Times masthead, reporting from the campaign trail, filing dispatches about Chinese foreign policy for the New York Times and much more.

In honor of Randy and all he did for young journalists, AAJA-LA held the first annual Randy Hagihara mentoring day on Sept. 16 at Cal State L.A., co-sponsored by NABJLA and NLGJA Los Angeles.

Greg Yee



Gregory Yee was that rare journalist who truly loves breaking news. From the moment he returned to his hometown as the night reporter for the Los Angeles

Times, he distinguished himself with speedy, well-written takes on everything from wildfires to mountain lions to all manner of murder and mayhem.

When he didn't sign in for his 3 p.m. to 11 p.m. shift one afternoon in early January, his co-workers knew something was wrong. Greg was found dead at age 33 in the Hollywood bungalow he shared with his pit bull mix, Jake. His family said the cause appeared to be complications from

a respiratory issue.

Before coming to The Times in the summer of 2021, Greg covered criminal justice for the Post and Courier in Charleston, S.C. He was a talented photographer who populated his Instagram with images of L.A. cityscapes, Jake and the spreads he cooked for friends, including a low country boil with sides of cheese grits, mashed potatoes and red rice.

In Greg's honor, AAJA-LA and the Los Angeles Times created the Gregory Yuen Yee Scholarship for early career journalists, which provides funding for skills training and professional development. Visit https://aaja-la.org/greg-yee/ for information on applying or donating.
